In addition to coursework focused on preparation to work with diverse populations, student teachers in St. Lawrence University's teacher education program are required to provide at least one period per day in service to the school's special education programs, working alongside school staff members in the resource room or with identified students mainstreamed into the classroom(s). This includes learning the contents of each of their identified students' IEPs and serving as team members with school staff in implementing them. Students at the University must also complete two courses (7 semester hours) studying literacy development for diverse populations including ELL. While there is a very low percentage of ELL in the region's schools, student teachers are able to work with those who are ELL.
